Intended Learning Outcomes (ILO)

On completion of the course the student shall:

Knowledge and Understanding

- demonstrate knowledge of central concepts, theories, models, and perspectives in leadership and organizing
- demonstrate understanding of how internal and external conditions influence the leadership, organization, and development of organizations
- demonstrate knowledge of communication processes, interpersonal interaction, and the role of learning in organizational contexts

Skills and Abilities

- demonstrate the ability to identify, analyze, and discuss leadership and organizational problems as well as possible courses of action
- demonstrate the ability to apply theories and models in leadership and organizing to both fictional and real cases
- demonstrate the ability to plan, lead, and contribute to meetings and group decision-making processes
- demonstrate the ability to communicate analyses and reflections within the course area both orally and in writing

Judgement and Approach

- demonstrate the ability to evaluate different alternatives for organizing, leading and developing operations based on scientific, societal, and ethical aspects
- demonstrate the ability to reflect on the professional role in relation to leadership, communication, and collaboration

Content

The course addresses fundamental perspectives on leadership and organizing. The focus is on how organizations are managed, coordinated, and developed in relation to their purpose, internal conditions, and surrounding context. Particular attention is given to contradictions, tensions, and developmental needs in organizations, as well as the role of communication, interaction, and learning. The course contributes to knowledge, skills, and abilities in management, leadership, and organizing through analysis and application of theories and models in relation to both fictional and real cases.

The course includes the following elements:

- operations management

- learning in organizations
- perspectives on change, improvement, development, and innovation
- leading interaction and communication processes
- leading and organizing in relation to internal and external conditions
- identifying opportunities and barriers for organizational development
- the relationship between technology, context, and internal organization
- application of previous courses, covered methods, and models

Type of Instruction

Teaching consists mandatory seminars. During seminars focusing on communication training, video recording may occur.

Language of instruction is Swedish or English.
